

Slavutyych

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Geography

Slavutych is situated on the left bank of the river Dnipro, 40 kilometers from Chernihiv, 45 kilometers from the city of Pryp'yat, 50 kilometers from Chernobyl and 200 kilometers from Kiev.



While being geographically located in Chernihiv Province, administratively it belongs to Kiev Region, being an administrative exclave, not belonging to any region.

History



The city was built in 1986 shortly after the Chernobyl nuclear disaster, to provide homes for personnel of the Chernobyl Nuclear Power Plant (ChNPP) and their families, evacuated from the abandoned city of Pryp'yat.

Town Slavutych was named after the Old Slavic name of the nearby Dnieper River.



The economic and social situation of the city is still heavily influenced by the power plant. Many of the residents still work or previously worked in the energy industry of the region.

Overview

From the very beginning this town was planned to become a “town of the future” or “the 21st century city”. In comparison to other cities of Ukraine Slavutych has rather modern architecture with pleasant surrounding according to the highest standards of living.

Living conditions in the town are much higher than in most other cities in Ukraine. Workers and architects from eight different former soviet republics were involved into the construction of the city: Armenian SSR, Azerbaijan SSR, Estonian SSR, Georgian SSR, Latvian SSR, Lithuanian SSR, Russian SFSR and Ukrainian SSR.





As a result, the city is divided into eight districts named after the capitals of the contributing republics, each with its own unique style and atmosphere.

This town has eight kindergartens, a youth center, a modern community center, a town hall, an Internet cafe, numerous sports facilities, modern hospital and a hotel.
